## REFLECTION

## Luke 18:9-14

The parables in the Bible cause us to face the truth of who we are in Christ, and the reality of our relationship with him as believers and today's parable is no exception.

On the one hand we have the Pharisee who seems to have turned his faith and spiritual practices into a competition, and is keen to show himself to be better than others. On the other hand, we have the tax collector, who on the face of it would be in more spiritual peril than the Pharisee, but proves himself in fact to have a much more genuine and honest relationship with God. But the Pharisee still insists on distancing himself from those who he sees as sinners, overlooking the obvious genuine piety of the tax collector and judging him based on what little he knows of his lifestyle.

The reality of the human condition is that we are often tempted to compare ourselves to others, to judge, and to keep score. For our children and young people this exacerbated by our present-day social media culture where we can be overwhelmed by the barrage of celebrities and influencers telling us what we need to buy, wear, do, and the lifestyles we must lead to be better, do better, live better than our neighbour.

The reality is however that with God we always have the opportunity to do better, to be better. We always have the chance to begin again, to be forgiven and find our renewal in Jesus Christ our saviour. Rather than comparing ourselves with or judging others, this parable invites us to be honest in our own relationship with God and to surrender to the reality that we all need God in our lives.
