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#### **Rev Dave Richards writes:**

#### It's that time of year again - Pentecost

- the celebration of the coming of God's Holy Spirit! I am always sad that, for many Christians, the whole idea of the Holy Spirit is a mystery. If you ask the average churchgoer about God the Father, or Jesus his Son, you get a reasonable answer. All too often when



we ask about the Holy Spirit the response is a resounding Ummmmmmm...... The sadness is even greater because it's the Holy Spirit who lives in us, and, potentially, enables us to serve Jesus effectively.

The theology is quite simple. When Jesus was born into the world, God became present with us in Jesus. He was present in a physical form, with inevitable physical limitations. Jesus died on the cross to give us a new beginning, (make us born-again), and was resurrected to show that God had defeated sin and death and was offering us a new relationship with him. When the first disciples saw the risen Christ (John 20:19-23), they worshipped him, and believed in him. Jesus then breathed on them and gave them the Holy Spirit, (as he had promised). 40 days later Jesus ascended to heaven, but left the Holy Spirit behind, so that he would be present and alive in every single Christian.

At Pentecost, we saw that Spirit at work, the Good News of Jesus was proclaimed, 3,000 people were baptised in one day, and the Church was born! Yes, Pentecost is the birthday of the Church – because it's the day the Holy Spirit gave power to God's people to get on with the job - proclaiming the Good news of Jesus.

The Holy Spirit is part of the package for every Christian. He can do great things, transforming our lives with "...the fruit of the Spirit ..... love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control." (Galatians 5:22-23), and giving us His gifts for ministry and mission. (See 1 Corinthians, 12:7-11, or Ephesians 4:11-12 more detail). The problem is that the Holy Spirit is sometimes like the bit in a kit which seems to be spare, the bit that we can't quite fit in, that gets left out.


So why do we know so little about the Holy Spirit? Maybe we preachers have not taught enough about the Holy Spirit; maybe the fact that Pentecost does not, any longer, come with a Bank Holiday has had the effect of downgrading the Holy Spirit in our understanding? Or maybe it's part of the devil's plan – make sure that these Christians don't get to know about the Holy Spirit, otherwise they may begin to be a much more effective witness to the world?

Whatever the reason for past failings, let's make this Pentecost different. When we hear the words from John's Gospel: "I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you for ever. This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you. (John 14:16-17), let's pray that this Spirit will work in each one of us, set us on fire for Jesus, and empower us in His service.

As we celebrate the Church's birthday at Pentecost, let's pray for the Spirit's unity amongst Christians, for God's Spirit to be free in each of us, for God to give us the right things to say, and do, in the right place, at the right time, by the power of His Spirit.

#### St Mary's Notes

At the Annual Meeting of Parishioners (AMP) on 1st April, a full complement of six Churchwardens was elected, two for each of our parish churches - All Saints', St Mark's, and St Mary's. The AMP's sole business is election of churchwardens. It seems to me to be a somewhat archaic way to select churchwardens though the current mode of election is ruled by the relatively recent 2001 Churchwardens Measure. Anyone on the parish's Electoral Roll, or on the local government Electoral Register covering the parish, can vote at the AMP.

**The Annual Parochial Church Meeting** (APCM) is purely for those on the church Electoral Roll and deals with church business - election of PCC (parochial church council) members for example. Appointment of Sidesmen/women (our Assistant Churchwardens) is by the PCC.

We are delighted to welcome Ray Davis as a new churchwarden for St Mary's. After serious illness and very major surgery at the end of last year, which brought forward his retirement as Verger at St Mary's, Ray has only recently been able to attend church and resume his place in the choir. I can already report that he has already dealt with a matter needing attention – the replacement of disintegrating paving outside the West (main) Door and making good crumbling cement surfaces on the wheel-friendly slope to the South Door and around drain covers. Another recent repair has been replacement of the heating elements in the Rectory Classroom kitchenette cooker – very necessary for the popular pizzas at the Friday Fun Club!

Ascension Day this year is on Thursday, 29th May. In 2016, Archbishop Justin Welby introduced thy Kingdom Come, nine days of prayer and anticipation lasting from Ascension Day until Pentecost, when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit. "Pentecost" comes from the Greek for fifty, denoting the 50 days since Easter Day. Pentecost is often regarded as the church's birthday. It's also called Whitsun, derived from the Old English term for "white Sunday" and the ancient tradition of baptisms on that day associated with white clothing symbolising purity and new life received through baptism.

**On Ascension Day,** as usual at St Mary's, there will be a Choral Eucharist at 7.30pm. For those who attend, a glass of something and nibbles will be available afterwards!

#### St Mary's Clock

Timekeeping, especially in convents and monasteries has always been an important part of Christian devotion. Timekeepers resembling large egg timers, or carefully crafted candles and of course sundials were used before mechanical clocks were developed. There is evidence of mechanical clocks in Europe from the late 13th century, though these were without dials and used for sounding bells for prayer (the name derives from the Latin clocca, meaning bell).

St. Mary's, Swanage became a parish church in 1487, having previously been merely a chapel of ease for the parish of Worth Matravers (with Priests Way being the route between the two). As a chapel of ease, it is unlikely to have had its own clock, and it is unknown whether one preceded that installed in the tower of St. Mary's, in 1725. It was made by Isaac Cloud of Beaminster, whose family were for several generations well known Dorset clock makers. This clock had a single diamond shaped face, on the south side of the tower, as shown in a print displayed in the West end of the church. It had only one hand, which would have significantly simplified the clock mechanism. By the middle of the following century, it was deemed past its best. Perhaps being single handed, it was considered rather tired?

The current clock was made by Frederick Dent & Co, of the Strand, London. This prestigious family firm also made the clock that chimes Big Ben, which is probably the best known clock in the World.

Another was installed for the Crystal Palace Great Exhibition of 1851 (and subsequently at King's Cross Station). Our clock was made in July 1860, costing the princely sum £156, (the equivalent today of around £25,000). This time it had two hands and two faces, on the South and East sides of the tower. By 1889, trees on the East of the church were obstructing the view of the clock, so the clock face was re-sited onto the West side of the tower. Ironically, reverting to the original arrangement would probably give better visibility today.

St Mary's Tower has several floor levels. At the first floor there is a room, formerly used by the youth group. Above that is the ringing chamber, where the bell ropes are arranged in a large circle for the ringers to pull. The clock chamber is at the third floor, in the centre of which is a large wooden cabinet containing the clock itself, with horizontal shafts leading to the two clock faces on the outside walls. The bells are on the 4th floor (top) level, so the bell ropes drop down in wooden ducting through the clock chamber around the clock itself. The clock is driven by 2 massive weights that run in a boxed enclosure down the inside of the tower from third floor to ground level. One weight powers the 'going train' (the pendulum system providing the timekeeping) and the other is for the 'striking train', that operates a pair of hammers striking the No. 5 bell to chime the hour. (On a smaller clock it is usual to have just one hammer striking the hour. Alternating a pair of hammers permits a reasonably brisk strike in spite of their inertia). Until 2006, winding the clock was a weekly task, though not for the weak, since it involved large crank handles for each train, and more than 50 turns of each to haul the weights back to the top. The door of the clock cabinet has its inside face covered with details of who and when various people took responsibility for repairing and rewinding the clock. Nowadays the clock is wound automatically by a pair of electric motors. Care was taken to ensure that this modernisation is reversible, so that originality is not impaired.

Last year, the clock started behaving erratically, gaining and losing unpredictably and it was also noticed that the hands on the South face showed a different time from that on the West face. It was also observed that the South face would suddenly gain about 3 minutes on the hour, and lose the same at the half hour. The hands were loose and

threatening to fall off, posing a threat to anyone passing below. An inspection determined that no quick fix was possible, so the hands were removed, a repair plan was prepared, and costs estimated. Grant funding is currently being sought to meet these costs. Until then, we must put up with the clock having a sad empty face.


The inside of the clock face

#### **News from All Saints**

Looking back over the last month, as you might expect, our Easter celebrations have been the focal point. As mentioned in a previous magazine, we hosted a 3 day prayer room focused on Jesus' journey through Holy Week. It was a powerful preparation for our corporate events towards the end of the week. Fifty of us gathered on Maundy Thursday around long tables in the church to share a meal as Jesus would have done with his disciples. We paused at various points in the evening to read gospel passages from the evening, sing and ended in silence sharing bread and wine around the tables.

After the seriousness of our gathering on Good Friday and walking down to the Bandstand in silence behind the cross, Easter Sunday at All Saints was a hugely joyful burst of praise. Those of us who made it down to the beach for 6am were blessed with sunshine as well as a great cooked breakfast thanks to the faithful saints at the United Reform Church.

A small group from All Saints attended Spring Harvest in Minehead: for those who haven't come across Spring Harvest, it is a long-running Christian holiday / festival / conference held at Butlins over the Easter holiday— and has been the source of huge encouragement, spiritual growth and fun in previous years. The theme this year was "No Greater Story" and we as a whole congregation were greatly blessed by those who went sharing their stories in a Sunday service, of how the time away had impacted them and how they felt they had engaged with God. It was particularly moving to hear one participant share "We all

It was particularly moving to hear one participant share "We all have a story to tell, it's not the story we necessarily wanted or dreamed about, but it's OUR story, and God is a part of it. He's with us through it all, we just need to open our hearts to receive Him, welcome Him into our lives and walk with Him."

Speaker Dr Richmond Wandera, from Compassion UK particularly spoke to another All Saints member; his story struck her deeply as she'd volunteered out to Uganda only last year, where Richmond himself had been an orphan, taken from the streets by Compassion. A church leader and powerful advocate for justice, Richmond also leads an organisation seeking to train church leaders in East Africa and speaks powerfully of the impact for God's kingdom that each individual can have: "Each one of us is called to play our part of God's great story."

Another was encouraged by the recent report from the Bible Society entitled "the quiet revival" which indicates that church attendance is growing across the board- especially amongst Gen Z. So watch out Swanage – who knows what God might have in store for us!

It was so encouraging to hear the feedback from those who went, and we have already booked 3 chalets for next year! If you'd like more information about Spring Harvest or might like to come with the All Saints group, do contact Tim Silk, allsaintsswanage@gmail.com.

One of my personal takeaways from Easter this year, has been from a deeper reflection on the Emmaus Road story in Luke 24. I have read the story so many times and yet this time, something completely new struck me. It is Resurrection Day itself - most of the 11 Apostles have not yet met the Risen Christ, and where do we find Jesus - on a road leading away from the action, spending several hours with 2 disillusioned disciples that we have never heard of before. We might have expected the newly risen Christ to have focused on the faithful 11, or even perhaps his inner circle of 3! But no - the risen Jesus invests time in 2 unknown disciples who have given up. extraordinary! Our God really is the God who looks for those on the edges, the outsiders, the ones we might least expect. A powerful reminder for us as churches, to ensure that we orientate ourselves likewise.

Looking forward at All Saints, we will be seeking to look outwards with a Free Family Funday on 2-5pm Saturday 14th June. We will be running craft activities, games, having a giant inflatable slide, all washed down with friendly conversation and lashings of tea and cake; with the aim of welcoming faces old and new. We are particularly hoping to engage with those who wouldn't normally come to an event at church and be a blessing to the local community. #### The East Window at St. Mary's

My memory was sparked by Anthony Malpas's letter from the editor (Church Alive May 2025) describing the East Window at St. Mary's. As a child, in the early 1950s, I remember the rector, the Rev. Norman Miller, describing the newly installed window to the children of the Sunday School.

The original window had been badly damaged by a bomb falling nearby during World War 2. We were enthralled by its beauty and the vision it gave of Jesus and His Resurrection. We were also aware that money was being raised to pay for this work of art so my friend, Hilary Shearstone, rallied a group of us to put on a "show" for family and friends.

Hilary wrote a short play, other members recited poetry, danced, sang, played the piano and gave a short talk. We were aged between 7 and 9 years! Hilary's father painted scenery and we performed in one of the laundry rooms (of which her father was the manager), the audience sitting on laundry baskets! The rector was so moved by our efforts that he asked us to repeat the performance to a larger audience in the Church Hall, which stood by the stream in King's Road where flats are now located.

Our efforts raised a modest sum, but I often wonder which piece of glass we funded! The window continues to draw my gaze: at confirmation, marriages, family funerals and as we declare our faith. Thank you, Anthony for bringing back childhood memories.

- · Work with the PPGs of the other Practices within the Purbeck Primary Care Network (PCN) and the Purbeck Youth PPG to support the PCN to deliver its priorities, including the development and implementation of the Purbeck Integrated Neighbourhood Team (INT)
- · Support the Practice to deliver initiatives that promote health and wellbeing, prevent ill health and support self-care
- $\cdot$  Promote awareness of the Purbeck Youth PPG (YPPG) and its remit, and support efforts to recruit new YPPG members
- · Contribute to the work of Action for Health and Care in Purbeck, the Purbeck-wide group set up in 2023.



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



#### Jack Spratt's scrap heap clock

To St Andrew's, Wootton Rivers, and an invitation to place the first signature in their new visitor's book, after the sixty-year service of its predecessor.

These volumes are found in most village churches and remain a quiet record of the thousands who call into our places of worship, usually unseen, and leave their appreciation with a word or two and, often as not, a coin in the box or a tap on the e-reader!

In Wootton Rivers, they will find in the porch a beautiful board telling the story of local character Jack Spratt, who achieved fame by constructing a church clock entirely from local scrap to commemorate the coronation of George V in 1911. As a new installation was too costly, handyman Jack invited villagers to leave him their spare bits and bobs and proceeded to make a clock that ran (and still runs) with pin-point accuracy. Instead of numerals on its face, the tower clock reads 'Glory be to God'. This eccentric and appealing project bears witness to the steady Anglican faith and resourcefulness vital for our churches to thrive and survive. Also, to the creator God whose spirit can work within us to make something wonderful from the scraps and times of our lives. To him be the glory.

#### Letter from the Editor

During May there were two events at the Swanage Bandstand that were inextricably linked. The first was a celebration of VE Day, which followed the Armed Forces Signing at Swanage Railway. Marion Booth kindly sends this report:

"Thank you Karen Grant for leading us in a happy sing song at the Bandstand on the morning of VE Day, 8 May. The sun shone, flags waved, and many wore Union flag items of headgear or clothing in those colours. It was a fitting tribute, ending with part of Sir Winston Churchill's speech, the last post from Eddie Chinchen on trumpet and midday two minute silence. Well done Swanage."

The second event, on 15 May, was to remember Swanage war time hero, Trevor Chadwick, who, with Nicholas Winton and Florence Nankivel and others, gave their lives to bring more than six hundred Jewish children to the safety of Britain from the horror and hatred of the Nazi regime. Their organisation is known as the "Kindertransport."

Mr John Corben, Chair of the Trevor Chadwick Committee, spoke about the beautiful statue of Trevor Chadwick, a crew member of the Swanage RNLI lifeboat. Trevor looks out over Swanage bay, a child in his arms and one beside him. One of the speakers was Paul Walder, whose father was brought to Swanage by Trevor Chadwick.

Both events remind us of the evil and hatred that still exists in our world, that will only end when the Lord Jesus returns, and "the Earth will be filled with the knowledge of the glory of God as the waters cover the sea." Habakkuk 2.14. At our Holy Communion services we say:

Christ will come again
