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The Team Rector writes

The Gift of Easter

Happy Easter - Christ is risen! We celebrate again the miracle of the empty tomb and the Jesus' resurrection. Over the next 50 days of the Easter season with hearts full of joy we continue celebrating 'the gloriously risen Christ.' Towards the end of this time, we commemorate Jesus' ascension into heaven and the great commission he gives to his disciples to continue his work. Finally we celebrate the fulfilment of his promise of the gift of the Holy Spirit to all believers on the day of Pentecost, which both completes and crowns the Easter season.

May all our churches be known as communities of hope. Let us not be timid but be bold in sharing this priceless gift we have as Christians in a world that is so desperately in need of hope.

May God richly bless you this season we continue to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ.

ST MARY'S NOTES

With the never ending rain and flooding that has been part of our lives for so many months now, the story of Noah's Ark and the flood, one of the best known stories in the Bible, springs to mind. With a



little delving I have learnt that the last major Ice Age ended about 10,000 years ago. Water levels rose dramatically. Entire seaside communities were destroyed leading to memories of a great flood. Some scientists argue that the Mediterranean Sea breached a blockage in the Bosporus and flooded a valley which then became the Black Sea. This event, the Black Sea deluge, would have happened around 5600 BCE. Others speculate about a tsunami or a comet. Perhaps the memory of one or more of these deluges is carried forward in the Bible's flood story of Noah and his ark. Noah had to persevere and trust in God's plan for him and at the end of the story, when Noah's family made it to safety, God made a covenant promise between him and humanity never to destroy the world again. The rainbow is given as a reminder of this covenant. We need to choose to remain faithful to God instead of worrying what other people think. However it is worrying to see the damage that has been caused by an excessive amount of rain in our seaside community. On a personal level and close to my heart (and house) part of the south west coast path has disappeared beyond Shep's Hollow and the steps taken by the sea long ago are now submerged by landfall! I'm looking for the rainbow.

Turning to more mundane matters, I can happily report that the west wall damage sustained about 15 months ago, has now been rebuilt. Our neighbours Steve and Jane Parker have been very patient and we are hopeful the damaged beech hedge will soon start showing green shoots again!

Our Junior Choir continue to blossom and in addition to singing, leading the prayers and lesson reading in our Family service on the first Sunday of each month, they are also joining the adult choir at Choral Evensong every 4th Sunday.

NOTES FROM ALL SAINTS

Music is a powerful thing: It has power to lift the heart, to engage the emotions, to soothe the soul. It provides a connection to what lies within us in a way that perhaps nothing else does. Right from earliest times music was part of the Jewish tradition. Although, as I reflected on music in the earlier parts of the Bible, trumpets appear in the first few books of the Bible, not as musical accompaniment, but as signals to call the people to move or to celebrate a particular feast; functioning like a church bell to alert people that a church service is starting soon, rather than something to lead a tune.

When the army of Israelites marched around Jericho for seven days, the



trumpeters were the central part of the army. It was when the trumpets gave a loud blast on the seventh day that the army was to shout, and the city walls would fall down. And they did. Ever since that moment, God's people have known that

worshipping God with musical instruments and song is an intrinsically powerful act. 1 Chronicles 20 tells us of how King Jehoshaphat led the Judean army to victory over a huge army from Moab and Ammon, no actual fighting took place – only musical worship! Such is the power of worshipping our God in song.

Now while it is certainly true that musicians have an important in our armed forces today, I am not sure that any of the military bands would be too pleased to find themselves on the front line as the first form of attack! And yet in the spiritual world, many have discovered the power of worshipping God in breaking down barriers and bringing the Spirit of God into situations where hope seemed lost. In worship we get to participate alongside the angelic worshippers around the throne of God himself; heaven comes in earth in a tangible way.

It is with great biblical history in mind that we at All Saints have been investing in our musical worship groups who lead us on a Sunday morning. It has been exciting to draw together people young and old and everything in between to lead the congregation in praising God and we have been encountering God powerfully in our times together on a Sunday morning. (It's been fun to fill the vicarage living room with musicians to practice midweek – now I know what that wonderful big room is for!) Over the coming months we hope to continue to build and strengthen our team as well as draw in some who haven't participated for a while.

As we seek God's leading for our next steps at All Saints, we're planning a 24-hour period of prayer and worship at the very beginning of May: from 6pm on Wednesday 1st May to 6pm on Thursday 2nd May. All Saints will be transformed into a "24-7 Prayer Room" with prayer stations to lead us in reflective prayerful activities as well as space to sit and be with God. There will be times of led worship and times of quiet. Perhaps you would like to come and take part for some of the time. There is something incredibly powerful about putting aside special time to seek God's face and meeting with him in a different setting.

Why not join us? You never know how you might encounter God in a new way.

April Showers!! 'Rain, Rain, go away come again another day!

We have had a very wet and, at times, very windy few days this winter. Christmas seems a distant memory now and no sooner had we celebrated Epiphany with a wonderful Team Service, than we were thinking about Shrove Tuesday, (*Pancakes*), Ash Wednesday and the start of Lent!

On Friday 1st March, St Mark's hosted the World Day of Prayer. Eleven churches were represented by members who participated in the service, making the morning so welcoming and inclusive, with prayers prepared by an ecumenical group of Christian women from Palestine, with the theme 'I beg you, bear with one another in love.' The service was well supported, and a collection was taken and generously supported.

Thank you to everyone who participated in making this such a great occasion.

The St Mark's Lent Lunch followed the World Day of Prayer, with many people joining us for a welcoming bowl of warming soup, bread, and cheeses. It was also St David's Day, so we had some tasty Welsh Soup, Daffodils, Leeks, we put up the Welsh Flag and we sang a well-known Welsh Hymn, suitably lead by our very own Welshman, Revd Dave Richards!!

We shared a lovely lunchtime resulting in a wonderful donation to Christian Aid of £354.00, with Gift Aid to be added. A big 'Thank You' to everyone who made soup, helped on the day, and supported the lunch.

As I write, we have just observed the

4th Sunday of Lent and celebrated Mothering Sunday, by distributing beautiful posies of daffodils to everyone.

The 'Difference' Lent Course; discussing The Three Habits, continues, and has brought many people together, through several groups, from different backgrounds, to enjoy discussion and fellowship exploring God and Jesus' teaching. St. Mark's Bible Study Group have joined in the Lent Difference Course and will continue with discussing St Mark's Gospel after Easter.

On Wednesday 13th March, there will be an Open Deanery Synod Meeting at Lady St Mary's Church Hall on Wareham Quay, with a presentation on the new Diocesan Vision 'Making Jesus Known', when several of us will be attending. Hopefully, we can feed back on how this vision will move forward, through five key action areas, and, as partners in this initiative, we can all be involved.

On Thursday 14th March St Mark's Church Committee Meeting was held. On Sunday 17th March, following the service, we held our Annual General Meeting, which I hope many of you were able to attend and participate in. A summary of this meeting will be given in May's edition of Church Alive, with news of appointments made for St Mark's for the coming year.

As we move through Lent towards Holy Week, St Mark's will be observing Palm Sunday on 24th March, with a Celebration Service with the Band. After Palm Sunday, Meditations and Compline was held in Church, at 6pm, on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in Holy Week.

Good Friday will be observed with a Meditation at 10:00am.

On Easter Sunday, 31st March, at 10:00am, we will have our Easter Family Communion, followed by celebratory refreshments in the meeting room, in keeping with our reputation as the 'Party Church'!

Letter from Bishop Stephen

At this time of year, we are beckoned outside after a long, cold and often wet winter. Spring has sprung and all creation calls us to go outside, to tend to our gardens and to admire the new life around us.

The benefits to our health from time outside are well known. Growing something from a small seed to a flourishing plant or flower requires care, skill and patience which not only brings us satisfaction but also slows us down. Unlike life in the modern world,

nothing in nature is instant or immediate – it will not be rushed.

In this Easter Season, our scriptures also draw us outside. On Easter morning, Mary Magdalene finds herself in a garden, outside of Jesus's tomb, so much so that she mistakes the resurrected Christ for the gardener. There is a vast passage of time between Adam and Eve's banishment from the Garden of Eden to that moment when, in a garden, Mary realises that it is the *risen* Christ who calls her by name. Yet now in that garden, Mary and all who throughout the ages proclaim, 'I have seen the Lord' are restored to God's eternal presence.

Maybe then there is something in the Easter Season when the resurrected Christ is 'made known' to us that can help us as we – as the Church of today – seek to make him known. Firstly, we need to go outside: to be active in our communities, in our schools and in reaching out to all as we show them the love of God; the God who – through Jesus – calls us by name. And secondly, all of this takes time. There can be an understandable anxiety about the often low numbers of people who come to church. Yet let us never forget that it took time for the good news of Jesus Christ to spread through active discipleship – like growth in a garden, nothing of this was immediate or instant – we need to persevere. As the Declaration of Assent made by all who are being ordained or licensed to a new appointment states, our faith is one that the church is called upon to 'proclaim afresh to each generation.'

I pray that we can do this; go outside, take time to build relationships with all around us, show to all the love, compassion and forgiveness of God and in doing so Make Jesus Known afresh, to all generations.



Swanage Skatepark Community Project (SSCP) is beyond excited to announce the first Swanage Skatepark Community Day; 1st June 2024, 12-5pm.

The event will be hosted by King Ramps of Bournemouth who will bring a 'pop-up skatepark street course' to fill the current empty space in Swanage Skatepark. King Ramps will provide skateboards and safety gear for anyone who doesn't have their own. Expect a fun packed day designed to bring the whole community together as SSCP begins to re-energise the park. "King ramps are really excited to be working with SSCP and the local community. We will be hosting workshops throughout the day as well as demonstrations with our King Ramps Pro team. We will also be holding contests throughout the day for Scooter, BMX and Skateboard. We can't wait to see everyone there!" - Richie Inskip, King Ramps.



Thanks to funding from local charity #Willdoes, entry to the event, use of equipment and access to lessons is all FREE. "We hope to show just how valuable a resource the skatepark is and get everyone behind our long-term goal of raising funds for new ramps. The event will increase access to skateboarding with free

beginner lessons for all age groups (adults are welcome too!) and guidance from coaches. It will be a fun day to make new connections, hone skills and be entertained by demos and competitions." - James Woodford, SSCP. "In 2023, SSCP ran a user consultation. There were over 220 votes from people who wanted to see beginner lessons, pro riders and skate jams taking place in Swanage Skatepark. We're thrilled this event will be delivering the things our community want" - James Woodford, SSCP.

The Community Day is important because it aims to improve social inclusion for teenagers and young people in Purbeck. The #Willdoes Community Bus



will be at the event to provide a safe space for young people to meet and access information and support. The Skatepark Community Day will take place on the closing weekend of a Crowdfunder Campaign set to launch in April 2024 to raise money for new ramps. Look how far we have come in the race to end the world's oldest disease

In 2024 – Olympic year - The Leprosy Mission marks Its 150th anniversary. The baton to end the world's oldest disease is now with a generation running the race with more tools and knowledge than ever Before.

The earliest evidence of leprosy dates to 4,000 years ago. We also read in the Gospels of how Jesus cured people with this disease during his time on earth. Leprosy should no longer exist in the 21st Century as there has been an effective antibiotic cure since 1982. Yet because we live in a fallen world, this disease continues to blight millions of lives today. The lives of some of the poorest and most marginalised people on the planet.

Supporters and Leprosy Mission teams around the globe are calling on governments, philanthropic organisations, churches and individuals to join the race to end leprosy. Chief Executive Peter Waddup explained that for the majority of The Leprosy Mission's existence there was no cure for leprosy.

Peter says, "All those who went before us could do was offer love and practical care for those who had been cast out by their families and communities. There was, and still is, so much fear when a person develops visible signs of leprosy.

"Yet today, as well as an effective cure, we have a diagnostic test and undertake contact tracing. By doing so we can detect and cure leprosy in family members before they develop disabilities. There are also scientific advances in the pipeline that will hugely accelerate the race to stop the transmission of leprosy. We have better ways to heal ulcers and world-class reconstructive surgeons to help transform the lives of people disabled by leprosy. Crucially, there is a new generation of people affected by leprosy who are empowered to fight for their rights.

"Arm in arm with communities affected by leprosy, we want the 150th anniversary to be a launchpad to a world where no one is diagnosed with leprosy again. No one should live with a preventable disability caused by leprosy in this day and age. And no one should face discrimination just because they have this disease.

"The fight to end leprosy has never looked more hopeful and this is thanks to the incredible compassion and generosity of supporters. We believe that, with the right backing from governments, we can end leprosy. It is a disease that has haunted this world for too long and we are better equipped now than ever before to end leprosy."

"We praise our sovereign God for sustaining this mission through wars, pandemics and economic crises through the compassion of our amazing supporters. Wellesley Bailey, founder of the Leprosy Mission, famously said The Leprosy Mission was 'born and cradled in prayer.' One hundred and fifty years later, prayer remains at the very heart of everything we do. Each morning Leprosy Mission teams come together around the globe to thank God for blessing the work of our hands as we seek to end leprosy.

"I am so touched by the amazing stories of dedication and self-sacrifice among our supporters. I wish I could take each one to Asia and Africa, showing them the difference they are making to people every day."

In his talk the Rev Canon Richard Bartlett will consider the challenges in communicating faith in a changing world.

Richard Bartlett is currently based in the benefice of West Purbeck and is the Parish Vicar at Holy Rood, Wool. In his previous role as a missionary in Brazil with USPG (United Society Partners in the Gospel) and as Director of Mission Engagement at USPG based in central London, he has gained much experience on the subject.



A service of thanksgiving on the 200th anniversary of the RNLI

Part of an article written by a member of the Poole Lifeboat crew



As we arrived at Westminster Abbey, the sky above, was a perfect blue, spring sunshine, blending with the swarm of blue RNLI guernseys assembled on mass, that was quite a sight, representatives from every realm, every station and lifeguarded beach, and from the lifeboat College, support centres and from all elements of our RNLI story.

We made our way into the Abbey, chatting to people in the queue, we always say, if you are near a lifeboat station, you are close to home, we felt at home, all of us brought together in a magnificent building.

We sat in awe, there was much warmth

when our president for 52 years, His Royal Highness the Duke of Kent arrived and made his way up the aisle, a life of service. Most of the lifeboat stations around the coast have had the honour of welcoming him,

we remember when he came to Poole, a true advocate and ambassador for the RNLI.

The service began with the words of our founder Sir William Hillary his 'Appeal to the Nation', it resonated with us all, reigniting our passion and desire to be 'in constant readiness' to help others 'whom they have never known or seen', his values, his valour passed on and not diminished through the years.

Inevitably there would be a wave in a congregation full of lifeboat crew, a wave of raw emotion as 'Eternal Father, Strong to Save' reverberated around the gothic ceilings and with an extra verse added for this special day, it hit the heart and the brine crept out of a few eyes.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby shared his thoughts and lightened the mood, he ended his sermon with '200 years is something extraordinary to celebrate. A common purpose for 200 years is almost unknown. Saving life is the most precious gift of all, and the basis of these gifts in the life and self-giving of God is a model for everyone. So, as it shows that model, may God continue to bless and protect those who serve in the RNLI'.
